INTRODUCTION

The American History collection is adequate to support the courses taught in the Bachelor's program and Master's program. Complete conspectus sheets and checklists are available upon request for a more detailed examination of the collection.

HOLDINGS

The American History collection contains **65,095** titles in the E-F call number ranges, including **12,032** e-books. Total monograph expenditures for American History from 2013-2019 were **\$212,547.65** with **2,002** new titles added. These newer additions comprise **33%** of the current American History collection.

These numbers represent a snapshot of the collection, as titles are continually added and withdrawn for collection maintenance and growth. These numbers do not represent additional titles available through e-book databases.

PERIODICALS AND SERIALS

The Library has access to full-text journals available throughout the Library databases. There are over 214 journals in American History or related areas available electronically through database subscriptions. These can be found in EBSCO's Publication Finder http://bit.ly/20xb9HY. Of the 214 journals available within American History topics, 116 of those are peer-reviewed journals (http://bit.ly/2KIH2we). The Serials expenditures in American History for both print and electronic subscriptions and standing orders average \$32,109.86 from 2013-2019 (see table below.)

Dollar amounts spent on aggregator databases cannot be subdivided into subject categories. For 2018/19, the amount spent on aggregated databases was **\$277,797.00**, which came from the general fund.

SUMMARY

Strengths:

Total holdings, conspectus evaluation, and checklist comparisons indicate the overall American History collection is more than adequate to support the curriculum. Of particular note on the conspectus worksheet are the holdings in the subject areas of: History- Americas (General Indian N. America), History- United States (Colonial, Special Topics), History- United States, General Works, History- United States (Slavery & Civil War), History- United States (Since the Civil War), U. S.- State & Local History- Gulf States, and History- South America.

A review of the journal holdings reveals that the American History collection is adequate to support the curriculum.

Weaknesses:

Total holdings, conspectus evaluations, and checklist comparisons indicate that the weakest areas of the American History subject areas are the areas that focus on early Latin America (which is included in this assessment): Uruguay- Colonial, Uruguay- Local History & Description, Argentina- Colonial, and Bolivia- Colonial.

Recommendations:

The growth rate of the American History Collection should be maintained in order to provide support for the Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts as well as the Minor in History. It should also be maintained in order to provide support for degree programs in the Bachelor of Arts in Liberal Studies with a concentration in History, and Bachelor of Science in Education. The monograph collection should be generally increased, based on the Library budget. The periodical collection available via databases is substantial and should be maintained. The weak subject areas (noted above) should also be addressed in future additions to the collection.
