

in Tuscaloosa on November 4, 2005. According to the LSA's guidelines, "The Distinguished Alumni Award will recognize those alumni who have made an outstanding contribution to the library, information, and media professions and who have thereby achieved distinction."

An impressive glass award was presented to McAbee before a room full of friends, co-workers and fellow SLIS alumni. McAbee said that she was deeply honored by the recognition, and added that she was grateful to her colleagues at JSU, and to University Librarian William Hubbard, who nominated her for the award.

McAbee, who has held positions ranging from paraprofessional acquisitions assistant to Full Professor and Head of Library Services during her career at JSU, is active in state and national organizations. She has also mentored numerous young professionals and paraprofessionals and has written a number of articles that have been published in professional journals. McAbee holds a bachelor's degree in political science from Jacksonville State University, and completed her MLS while working full time at Houston Cole Library.

Miles for Melanoma ❖ Miles for Mom

Librarian Kim Stevens ran the Mercedes Marathon in Birmingham, Alabama on February 12, raising money for the Melanoma Research Foundation (MRF). Kim's mother, "Buddie" Weatherford, is battling this

cancer. The MRF's "Miles for Melanoma" program is a very low-key program, according to Stevens. Runners agree to run an event representing "Miles for Melanoma," print up brochures based on a template furnished by the MRF, and solicit donations. There is no minimum amount of funds to raise as in some other charity-sponsored runs, and all donations to a "Miles for Melanoma" run go directly toward research grants.

The nonprofit MRF, founded by melanoma patients and families, funds melanoma research. The mission of the MRF is three-fold:

- to support medical research for finding effective treatment and eventually a cure for melanoma;
- to educate patients and physicians about the prevention, diagnosis and treatment for melanoma;
- and to act as an advocate for the melanoma community to raise the awareness of the disease and the need for a cure.

While malignant melanoma is the least common form of skin cancer, it is the most deadly. It is also highly preventable and treatable, if caught early. No significant advances in medical therapies (or survival) for patients with advanced melanoma have occurred in the last 30 years.

This was Stevens' second marathon run to raise funds for cancer research. In 2002 she ran the inaugural Mercedes Marathon as a member of the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's "Team in Training."

Keeping it in the family, Stevens' husband, David Stevens, trained with her and also ran the marathon. "It was great running the marathon with David. We did most of our training runs together, which made the time go by more quickly," Stevens said. Fellow librarian and runner Laurie Charnigo also ran the recent Mercedes Marathon and was Stevens' frequent training partner. Charnigo's husband, Wayne Phillips, ran on a marathon relay team.

Stevens said the marathon was a rewarding experience and knowing that she was raising money for a worthy cause to help her mom made it that much more meaningful. She's not sure if she's going to tackle another marathon, but does see half marathons in her future.
