AUDIENCE SERVICES

BOX OFFICE HOURS: 8:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m., one hour prior to mainstage performances, and thirty minutes prior to Second Stage performances. The box office begins taking reservations for non-musical performances three weeks prior to the performance and for musicals two months prior to the performance.

TICKET EXCHANGE: We are happy to exchange tickets for the same play up to 48 hours prior to the performance if seating remains available.

WILL CALL: Upon request, and time permitting, tickets will be mailed. Otherwise, they will be held at the Box Office.

LATE SEATING: At the discretion of the management. Ticketed seat assignments are not guaranteed past curtain. The theatre does not have standing room.

SPECIAL ACCESS SEATING: Please let our box office representative know if we can offer assistance during your visit. We need at least 72 hours notice to prepare for special seating or to line up interpreters, if needed.

HEARING DEVICES: A limited number of hearing devices are available for the mainstage theatre. Please contact our Box Office to reserve one.

CHILDREN IN THE THEATRE: All patrons, regardless of age must have a ticket. While some of our productions are specifically produced with children in mind, most are best enjoyed by youth over the age of 13. For specifics as to language and subject matter, please call our box office prior to purchasing tickets.

Mazie and Gertrude, The Grinch, the Whos, the Cat and the Hat, and others are all brought together by a boy, JoJo—a young Who, who is a "thinker of strange and wonderful thinks!" and Horton who hears the tiny Whos as they hurtle through space with no ability to steer. It is the kind-hearted Horton's journey to save the Whos about which this story revolves. You will marvel at how relevant and profound Seuss' subtle themes are today—making this a musical that appeals to all ages. The score is a gumbo of musical styles ranging from Latin to pop, swing to gospel, and R&B to funk. So let your toes tap, your fingers snap, your imagination run wild, and come "open your mind for the thinks you will find!"

The Winner of 2006's Southern Playwright's Competition, *PIANO*, is the story of a poor farm family—a guilt-ridden mother and her two sons—years after the father has deserted them, and how they struggle to cope with the present while haunted by the past. Jim, who was a baby when his father left, is the only family member not mired in the past. He looks to the future and desires to go to college—but there is no money. The facts and truths revealed as the play progress take a toll on the fragile family while, at the same time, point the family toward reconciliation and a future healing.

As the family tries to "pull together" for their father's funeral, their other problems keep overshadowing what should be a very solemn occasion. Amidst all the chaos, the Turpins turn for comfort to their friends and neighbors, who themselves are an eccentric community of misfits who just manage to pull together and help each other through their hours of need—and the funeral. According to the NY Daily News *Dearly Departed* is "...drop dead funny."
