The data above are from a major study by the Chronicle of Higher Education. Overall, Alabama has a 47.5% graduation rate in six years. There are 14 states with lower percentages (and, doing the math, 35 with higher). The average percentage for the US is 56.0% to graduate in six years. The highest is Delaware with 70.8% graduating in six years. Overall, these numbers only include full-time, first-time freshmen. Any part-time student or student who attended college before is not counted. That non-counted fraction is about 40% of the total freshman students—a sizable number.

Overall, these data indicate that Senator Marsh was correct when he suggested that JSU needs to focus more on academics (see New Trustees below). I suspect we will be hearing more about graduation rates in the coming years.

Let me conclude by remarking that we have 18 students eligible for graduation this semester. I think that is a record for our Department. This is an important and significant outcome for our Department. Congratulations to everyone for your efforts and helping to contribute to this success. I hope to see many of you at Graduation next week.

Faculty Awards Reception

Three New Trustees (from the Anniston Star)

Gov. Robert Bentley nominated Clarence W. Daugette III, Gale Main and Vivian Davis Figures last week to serve on the board. After the Senate Confirmation Committee's unanimous approval, the nominees were confirmed by the Senate. Daugette, Main and Figures will replace outgoing board members Jim Folsom Jr., Jamie "Red" Etheredge and G. M. "Mack" Roberts, whose terms expired this year. Initially, Bentley nominated Folsom and Etheredge for another term on the board, but the governor's recommendation was denied by the Confirmation Committee earlier this month. Del Marsh serves on the Senate Confirmation Committee and presides over the governing body as the Senate's



President Pro Tem. Marsh said he'd like to see Jacksonville State focus on moving in a new direction.

"I really would like concentration on the academic side. I think in the past there has been a lot of emphasis on the athletic side," Marsh said.

Two of the outgoing members, Folsom and Etheredge serve on the board's athletic committee. During their tenure, the university took on a large-scale football stadium expansion project and explored expanding the football program.
