TEXAS - Big Bend National Park Study Tour:

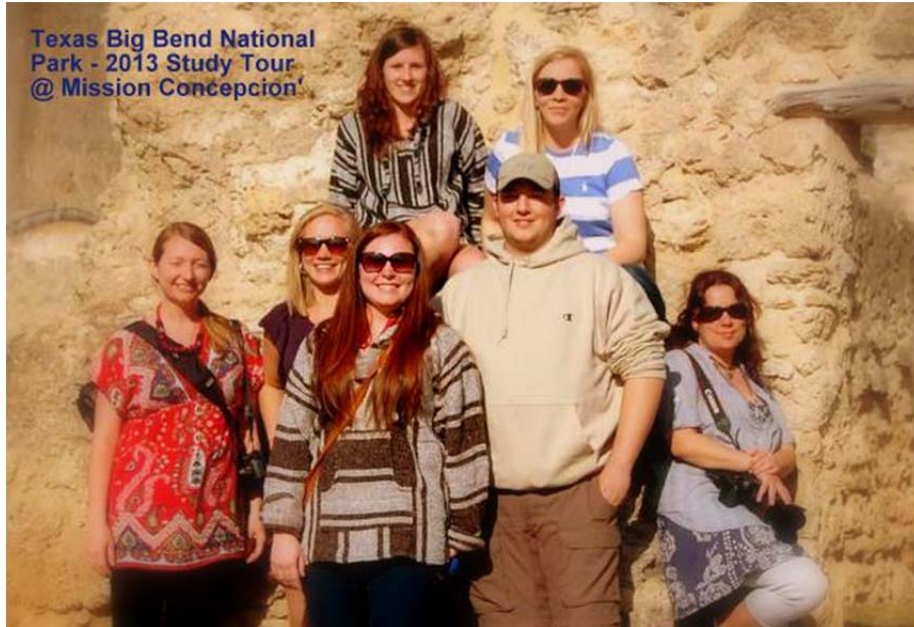

The trip led us into Austin the Capital of the Great Republic of Texas and then to San Antonio, believed to be the cultural epicenter in the region. From the Alamo (you all remember the Alamo, right) to the Mission trail dating from the mid 1800's. If you haven't done Riverwalk, you haven't done modern Texas with a multitude



of restaurants, shops, and more artist's boutiques that one can imagine. From there to Del Rio along the Texas-Mexico border through the Hill Country and into the Chihuahua Desert a beautiful but desolate place historically known as the "Despoblado" or without population. "Rainier is equipped with the Kongsberg EM710 Multibeam Sonar System and a Rolls-Royce Moving Vessel Profiler (MVP) 200 sound speed acquisition system, and the ship's five aluminum survey launches are equipped with four Reson 7125 dual-frequency multibeam sonars, one tilted Reson 8125 multibeam sonar, one ODOM Echotrac CV200 vertical beam echosounder, and HYPACK and HYSWEEP Hydrographic Data Acquisition Software" YOU MUST BE WORKING ON BATMAN'S BOAT!

Please note this service is offered only for ***circulating*** items; reference and other non-circulating items are excluded. When making their requests, patrons will need to provide Library staff with:

- A list of the items being requested
- A time the items will be picked up
- Contact information (the patron's name, student number, and an email/phone number)

Patrons will be ***required*** to show a photo ID at the pick-up site in order to receive their requested items.

Please note that the book drop (located in the Library parking lot) is open, and patrons may use it at any time to return their materials.

The Library apologizes for any inconvenience occasioned by construction efforts. Further information regarding Library operations will be forthcoming after Spring Break.
