



Welcome to the Jacksonville State University Economic Update for June 2022

This issue considers ongoing changes in labor market conditions as pandemic conditions and demand for labor seeks an equilibrium level for current needs. For this analysis we consider the number of posted job advertisements (*JobsEQ 3.0, Chmura*). An increase in job ads reflects higher demand for labor within those occupations, while a decrease in job ads is generally associated with lower demand. For each county in the CEDBR Region the number of job ads for top occupations is listed within the respective county and delineated by location within that county with totals summarized for the region. Totals include a summation for those municipal locations selected for this analysis. Other job ads may or may not be included from other unincorporated locations.

The analysis tallies job ads by occupation for June 2021 and June 2022 and expresses as a number change and percent change for occupation and location. Illustration of the net change in job ads within the reporting period for each county is presented in a figure at the end of this analysis. This analysis does not consider overall changes within the one-year period, but rather for the month of June for 2021 and 2022. Each occupational category is identified by Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) from the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and listed as follows:

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Blount County

The total number of job ads expanded by 47% between June 2021 and June 2022. Registered nurses occupation experienced the largest percent increase in job ads and the largest numerical change. With the exception of Warrior, Alabama job ads increased for each selected location. Oneonta, Alabama experienced the largest numerical increase and Cleveland, Alabama the largest percent increase, with the latter almost quadrupling.

Calhoun County

Registered nurses and fast food and counter workers occupations each experienced a quadrupling of the number of job ads. Heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers also experienced a significant increase of 35 additional job ads for June 2022. All selected localities experienced an increase in job ads in the reporting period, with the number of jobs ads more than doubling from 57 to 145 ads in Oxford, Alabama. Increases in other locations were double digit, with Anniston, Alabama experiencing the second largest numerical and percent change within Calhoun County.

Cherokee County

Job ads increased between 26% and 33% for three occupational categories – registered nurses, heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers, and retail salespersons. The largest numerical increase was for registered nurses. Each location experienced a double-digit increase in job ads with a total number of 258 job ads for June 2022 representing a 22% increase from June 2021.

Clay County

The number of job ads for fast food and counter workers more than tripled and more than doubled for registered nurses, with the latter category experiencing the largest numerical increase by occupation. Heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers were the only occupation to experience a decline in job ads, with nine fewer ads posted in June 2022 relative to June 2021. By location, the number of job ads increased by 94% for Ashland, Alabama, while declining by 18% and 17%, respectively, for Delta, Alabama and Lineville, Alabama.

Cleburne County

Job ads posted by occupational category either doubled or tripled. The number of job ads for registered nurses increased by 14, while front line supervisors of food preparation and serving increased by the largest percentage. In total, 42 additional job ads were posted in June 2022 compared to June 2021. By location, Heflin, Alabama and Ranburne, Alabama each experienced large increases in job ads, with the change for the former more than doubling and more than tripling for the latter, respectively.

DeKalb County

The number of job ads for heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers represents both the largest numerical and percentage increase for the county with 47 additional jobs posted in June 2022 compared to June 2021. Stock and order fillers is the only occupation category to have fewer job postings, while each of the other categories increased by double-digits. Of the 67 additional job ads posted within the reporting period, most were derived from Fort Payne, Alabama and the largest percent change in Collinsville, Alabama.

Etowah County

Total job ads increased from 158 to 248 from June 2021 to June 2022. Heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers and registered nurses experienced increases of 31 and 30, respectively, of the number of postings within each occupation category. The largest percent change in job ads occurred for first line supervisors of food preparation and serving workers, with postings for the category more than doubling. Of the 90 additional postings in June 2022 compared to June 2021, Gadsden produced 68 of the 90 for the largest percent increase by location.

Marshall County

Job ads surged from 135 to 253 posting from June 2021 to June 2022. Postings for heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers, software developers, and information security analysts increased by the largest percentages of each occupational category with the number of postings for the latter expanding by six times when compared to June 2021 levels. The total numerical increase is 118 in new job ads posted during the reporting period. By location, the distribution of job ads posted is relatively consistent; the percent increase in job ads posted more than doubled in Guntersville, Alabama, with the largest numerical increase in Albertville, Alabama.

Randolph County

Higher demand for heavy and tractor-trailer drivers reflects the largest numerical and percent change in job ads posted. Almost half (11/24) of new job ads is attributable to that occupational category. The number of job ads also doubled for first line supervisors of retail sales workers and speech-language pathologists. Job ads posted for Roanoke, Alabama represented the location within the largest numerical increase, while ads surged in percentage terms in Woodland, Alabama.

St. Clair County

Heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers, fast food and counter workers, registered nurses, and first-line supervisors of retail sales workers experienced significant increases in job ads by occupation during the reporting period. Sixty of the 72 additional job ads posted are attributable to these occupational categories. By location, the distribution of job ads is relatively concentrated in Moody, Alabama and Pell City, Alabama, although the number of job ads posted almost doubled in Springville, Alabama and increased by 50% in Ashville, Alabama.

Talladega County

Job ads increased by 16 postings each for fast food and counter workers and first-line supervisors of food preparation and serving workers during the reporting period. Other increases in job ads occurred for first-line supervisors of retail workers and stockers and order fillers. Two occupations – heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers – each reported fewer postings during the reporting period. Of the 32 total new job ads posted, ten are associated with employment in Talladega, Alabama, seven in Childersburg, Alabama and Sylacauga, Alabama and four in Lincoln, Alabama and Munford, Alabama.



Region data are a summation for total job ads by occupation across each county analyzed. The number of job ads posted total 1,455 for June 2021 and 2,180 for June 2022. The 725 additional postings within the reporting period represent a 50% increase.

The number of job ads increased from June 2021 to June 2022 for each county analyzed, representing a net increase of 725 job ads. New job ads represent the net change during the reporting period. When considering the change in job ads during the reporting period for each county as a percent of all new job ads in the CEDBR Region, Calhoun County and Marshall County experienced larger changes in the number of new job ads relative to the other counties. Of the 725 new job ads posted between the two months in the reporting period, 20% of that increase is attributable to Calhoun County new job ads and 16% to Marshall County new job ads. At 13% of the total new job ads, Etowah County also contributes significantly to the total.
