THE TEACHING/LEARNING CENTER CELEBRATES ITS 25TH YEAR OF PROVIDING SERVICE TO EDUCATION STUDENTS AND COMMUNITY CHILDREN

The College of Education and Professional Studies has provided a practicum for JSU students to connect with children for twenty-five years. The Teaching/Learning Center tutoring practicum combines the personal experience of teaching a child one-to-one with helping community children in their education. This connection meets a state requirement to prepare future teachers and provides a type of service learning to the community.

To date the tutoring practicum has involved over 11,874 JSU students. Over 7,157 community children have benefited from the tutoring by being provided over 118,502 hours of one-to-one academic help through the Teaching/Learning Center.

The Teaching/Learning Center is an on campus, after school, one-to-one tutorial site. It was established by Dr. Elsie Wright in 1982 to provide College of Education students an opportunity to work with children in a highly supervised tutoring program. Area school students in grades 1-12 participate. Before the Teaching/Learning Center, the only preservice experience for teachers was the practice teaching internship. In 1982, the Alabama State Department of Education increased the number of preservice hours required for teacher certification. The Teaching/Learning Center was part of the response by Jacksonville State University to meet the requirement.

In 1991, JSU developed a five level Clinical Experiences program. The Level II requirements are met through the Teaching/Learning Center practicum.

In the 10 to 25 hour practicum the JSU students experience what happens in an educational tutorial, they reflect on the tutorial, and they work to make it go better. The Teaching/Learning Center Coordinator, an experienced teacher, provides assistance and feedback to help ensure a successful session for both learners.

The children that come to the center usually are sent by teachers, counselors or parents. Community children that have participated represent more than sixty-five local schools. Many home schooled children attend the tutorials. The children may be working on

improvement of academic deficiencies or they may be tutored in further expanding their knowledge. The only requirement is that the parents or guardians bring the students to and from the campus. There is no cost for the tutoring.

In the early years the program was honored with recognition of the uniqueness of the program. The Teaching/Learning Center practicum was the recipient of the 1987 Innovation in Education Award given by the Southeastern Regional

Association. Nationally, this program was recognized by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities with the Christa McAuliffe Showcase for Excellence Award in 1988.

The College of Education and Professional Studies is committed to meeting the requirements and standards accrediting agencies that include Alabama State Department of Education, Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education.

Since continued service to the NSCA is essential to the organization's growth, successful candidates have demonstrated a long-term commitment to the mission of the NSCA. The designation of FNSCA reflects the professional stature of the Fellow and his/her record of valuable contributions to the NSCA.

HPER PROGRAMS APPROVED BY THE NATIONAL STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING ASSOCIATION AND ALABAMA COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION

Jacksonville State University Department of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation (HPER) has been approved by the National Strength and Conditioning Association and the Academic Affairs Committee of the Alabama Commission on Higher Education to provide programs that meet students' needs.

The National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA) recognized HPER's educational program in "Strength and Conditioning." After completing the program, the student will be prepared to sit for the Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist exam.

The NSCA has several Education Recognition Programs (ERP). The "Education Recognition Program in Strength and Conditioning" recognizes colleges and universities that offer a bachelor's degree with an emphasis in strength training and conditioning. For the HPER program to be recognized it provided documentation that the curriculum offered at least a baccalaureate degree. The Strength and Conditioning program does not have to be classified as a major, a minor, a sequence, or a concentration. It does, however, have to be a formalized area of study. HPER provided documentation that there is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS), who is a full-time employee involved in the educational program as a member of the teaching faculty and teaches a minimum of one class per academic year from the ERP required curriculum.


Jacksonville State University joins four other institutions in the state of Alabama approved to offer this program: the University of Alabama, Birmingham; the University of South Alabama, Troy University, and the United States Sports Academy.

Along with the national recognition HPER also received state approval for two programs. The Academic Affairs Committee of the Alabama Commission on Higher Education approved two proposals that allow the university to offer a concentration in athletic administration

in its Master of Public Administration program and a concentration in coaching for its Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education. The athletic administration concentration is designed for students interested in working for municipal recreation departments, athletic departments for community or junior colleges, and public organizations such as the YMCA or the Boys' Clubs.

Dr. Jeff Chandler, head of the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, said, "People get hired by a university or college, or students working as graduate assistants, want or need to get a master's degree for their employment. Right now they don't have an option to concentrate in coaching. Now the university can allow students to pursue the concentration as part of their degree focus."

Dr. William A. Meehan, President of Jacksonville State University, explained, "When I went into education I was asked to coach basketball, and though I had watched it a great deal I knew nothing about teaching it. With this concentration in coaching in the Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education program, students can learn some skills and the characteristics needed for coaching. It doesn't certify them to coach any particular sport, but it does offer some practical application. Expanding the concentration in athletic administration in the Master of Public Administration program offers people who work in public recreation organizations, but who have degrees in other areas, an opportunity to develop new skills without obtaining a new degree."





MS. GINA MABREY WORKS TO EDUCATE THE CAMPUS ON MAKING HEALTHY CHOICES

To help faculty, staff and students learn the benefits and practices of healthy living, HPER's Wellness Coordinator Ms. Gina Mabrey in collaboration with the Campus Wellness Committee has launched the Get Well JSU campaign. The campaign is comprised of Wellness Wednesdays, a new monthly event located in Jack Hopper Dining Hall. Faculty, staff and students are offered a healthy-choice lunch line of the cafeteria. Following lunch, Ms. Gina Mabrey shares a short presentation that emphasizes the importance of



DR. MARK KOVACS AND DR. JEFF CHANDLER PUBLISH "TENNIS TRAINING: ENHANCING ON-COURT PERFORMANCE"

Dr. Mark Kovacs, Mr. Britt Chandler, and Dr. Jeff Chandler have co-authored a book titled *Tennis Training: Enhancing On-court Performance* through Racquet Tech Publishing. Two of the authors are professors in the Department of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, the third is the son of Dr. Chandler.

Tennis Training: Enhancing On-court

Performance reviews over 300 tennis-specific scientific studies for the reader. Its goal is to help the coach, the strength and conditioning specialist, athletic trainer, medical doctor, and parent develop the tennis athlete's full potential. Included in the book are exercises and training programs that can be used by competitive tennis players. Photographs and sample programs illustrate the latest tennis specific information on strength training, speed and agility training, flexibility training, nutritional information, long and short term program design, and tennis specific testing. Along with the reviews of over thirty years of research, the book is designed to summarize the science involved with tennis training.



Dr. Kovacs is in his first year as a professor at JSU. He is a former top 100 junior International Tennis Federation player and an All American/ NCAA doubles tennis champion at Auburn University. Dr. Kovacs has a special interest in research on tennis performance and has publications in scientific journals related to tennis performance.

Mr. Britt Chandler is certified as both a strength and conditioning specialist and personal trainer. He also is a certified tennis coach through the United States Professional Tennis Association. He currently works as both a tennis coach and strength conditioning specialist. Mr. Chandler is also the editorial assistant for the *Strength and Conditioning Journal*.

Dr. Jeff Chandler has over 20 years experience as a tennis researcher and sports science consultant for numerous tennis organizations. He is currently the Chair of the Scientific Committee for the Society of Tennis Medicine and Science, and a Sports Science Consultant to the Professional Tennis Registry.



DR. LARRY BEARD INDUCTED TO THE WORLD HEAD OF FAMILY SOKESHIP COUNCIL HALL OF FAME

Dr. Larry Beard, associate professor of Special Education, Jacksonville State University, was recently inducted into the World Head of Family Sokeship Council Hall of Fame as the Male Instructor of the Year in martial arts. Black Tie ceremonies were held in Orlando, Florida. Dr. Beard was recognized by the World Sokeship Council for his contributions to the martial arts spanning over 40 years.

The World Head of Family Sokeship Council is an exclusive union of the top Grandmasters of 9th or 10th degree black belt ranking or the equivalent from around the world who wish to communicate and support one another. Membership includes some of the best martial artists in the world and at least 19 different countries are included among its membership.

The World Head of Family Sokeship Council was founded in May of 1993 by Professor Frank E. Sanchez of Guam and is, without a doubt, the most elite Grandmasters/Soke organization in the world with the most recognizable martial arts names in history of any Soke or Grandmasters council currently in existence. Some of the more notable members include Don “The Dragon” Wilson, Jackie Chan, Bill Wallace and Reylson and Rickson Gracie.

Dr. Beard holds an eighth dan (blackbelt) in judo/ yudo, eighth dan in jujitsu, and fourth dan in karate. Dr. Beard has been teaching martial arts for nearly 40 years, including the last five at JSU.

Dr. Beard’s coach, John E. Chambers, president and founder of Martial Arts USA said, “A natural—a person who appears to have been born to master a particular sport—is a very rare commodity. The highest compliment or praise that I could give any martial artist would be to call that person a natural. Larry Beard is a natural.”

Machine vision detects defective parts or other anomalies in a production process using specialized cameras and software. Both Mr. Greene and Mr. Helin completed the "live", in-class version of the Master of Science in Manufacturing Systems Technology, and the Department of Technology and Engineering looks forward to its first graduates from the on-line program in the Fall of 2007.

EMCETS2 SCHOLARSHIPS FOR TECHNOLOGY STUDENTS

It's a fact: there are not enough students pursuing math, computer science, and engineering-related degrees to satisfy the demands for these skills in the American economy. The EMCETS2 Scholarship program was developed for the purpose of encouraging more students to select these fields of study and then enter the US workforce and fill those skill gaps.

EMCETS2 is a \$500,000, 5-year renewal of the original EMCETS scholarship program, which began in the Fall of 2002. The scholarship program provides up to 20 academic scholarships each year for students pursuing degrees in Math, Computer Science, or Engineering Technology. The National Science

Foundation (NSF) awarded the grant to Jacksonville State University through the NSF Scholarships in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (S-STEM) program.

For the College of Education and Professional Studies, the renewal of the EMCETS program grant means that students interested in Manufacturing Systems Technology or Electronics Technology degrees offered by the Department of Technology have the opportunity for full-tuition scholarships. The scholarships are awarded based on a number of criteria, including GPA and financial aid qualification. The scholarships are renewable based on continued academic achievement.

Upon his arrival at Jacksonville State University for the 2005-2006 academic year as an Assistant Professor of Secondary Education, Dr. Barkley was approached by Gloria Horton, Director of the Jacksonville State University Writing Project, to become involved in all JSU's Writing Project site has to offer. For summer 2006, Dr. Barkley was asked to direct a one-day mini institute for first and second year teachers from local schools. With both guidance and assistance from Mrs. Horton, Dr. Barkley organized "A Menu for Success: A Mini Institute for First and Second Year Teachers."

Summer 2007 saw a second, more fruitful, mini institute during the month of July. Eighteen local first and second-year teachers from nearly all content areas gathered from 8:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. for a comprehensive workshop including topics such as: tips and tricks for success, assessment in the classroom, teaching writing, content area literacy strategies, and

the importance of joining professional organizations. Teacher consultants, and in many cases, graduates from Jacksonville State University's Secondary Education Program, led the workshops, encouraging participants to not only take notes on each topic but to also work through selected activities just as their students would.

Perhaps an equally important experience, though not formally mentioned during the workshop, was the visible partnership between faculty from the College of Education & Professional Studies and the College of Arts and Sciences. While both colleges play integral roles in the education of our candidates, rarely are they able to bring those candidates back to campus after graduation for free workshops that help cement the importance of both content knowledge and sound educational practices.

Dr. Barkley looks forward to his continued involvement with both the National and Jacksonville State Writing Projects, directing the mini institute, and educating pre-service teachers. His involvement with writing project sites has afforded him the opportunity to share his knowledge of teaching writing and to learn from the teachers with whom he has worked.



DEPARTMENT OF SECONDARY EDUCATION SENIOR VISITATION DAY

On March 5, 2007, the Department of Secondary Education welcomed 162 high school seniors from 18 surrounding schools interested in becoming professional educators. NEW AUTOMATION SYSTEM FOR WLJS

The new satellite delivery system replaces an obsolete system that used the old "OS2" operating system. The new system is based on a new automation system that allows NPR programming to be downloaded and used as needed. In addition, the system can fully

Jacksonville State Manager of Student Media Mr. Mike Stedham said, "Ted White did a great job of installing the new equipment. This will allow us to train our student announcers on the same type of automation systems they will find when they get their first job with a commercial station."

TELEVISION SERVICES PRODUCTION TECHNICIAN

A new scoreboard at Paul Snow Stadium, a new look for "Inside Gamecock Athletics," and a new show all about JSU means a new staff person for JSU's Television Services. Mr. Steve Kines began this new position as Production Technician by being trained to operate and program content into the Daktronics ProStar Video Display Screen at Paul Snow Stadium.

The control room for the scoreboard is located in a windowless room in the bottom of the east stands. On game day, Mr. Kines and Television Services engineer Mr. Ted White are busy with all the bells and whistles, not to mention animated graphics, videos, commercials and JSU ads, and sound effects that make the game day experience enjoyable.

Television feeds from a production truck outside the stadium allows them to show instant replays and fan-oriented features. It is much like running an entirely separate TV broadcast.

Mr. Kines also hit the ground running by being responsible for producing "Inside Gamecock Athletics." This television program is created weekly during football season. The program features highlights from the football games, comments from Head Coach Jack Crowe and interviews with JSU football players. "Inside Gamecock Athletics" can be seen during football season on TV24. The program may also be seen on the

College Sports Southeast (CSS) Channel. CSS is a 24-hour regional sports network serving approximately 8.5 million cable subscribers across 11 southeastern states and is based in Atlanta.

Mr. Kines and the TV Services staff are working on plans to produce a new show starting in the spring of 2008. This new show will be about current events happening at JSU. If all that were not enough to keep Steve busy, he will also be providing technical assistance to the Communication Department.

DR. CYNTHIA HARPER PRESENTS AT THE OXFORD ROUND TABLE IN OXFORD, ENGLAND

Dr. Cynthia Harper was selected from a group of professional nominees throughout the United States to participate in the Oxford Round Tables in March 2007 in Oxford, England. The Round Table provides an interdisciplinary forum for participants to discuss contemporary issues that include human rights, social welfare, economics, religion, ethics, morals, law, medicine, liberal arts and sciences. The theme for the week focused on public versus religious education. Participants were invited to present papers and engage in discussions regarding the papers in both formal and informal dialogue. Dr. Harper presented a paper based on a qualitative research study that she conducted in the winter of 2006–2007. Research included interview data gathered from selected public and private P/12 teachers with experience teaching in both religious and

public educational institutions. Round Table participants are selected based on specific criteria. Included among these are nominations by former participants, courses taught by participants, professional presentations and professional involvement. Nominees are from diverse institutional settings including private, public, and institutions representing various levels of education.

Dr. Harper was fortunate to be housed in Pembroke College during her week at Oxford. Founded in 1347, Pembroke is the third oldest of the Cambridge colleges and is located in the middle of Oxford. The buildings are filled with history and offer a peaceful, open court architectural style to visitors.

Dr. Harper describes the experience as an educational opportunity of a lifetime.

Several themes emerged from the Oxford study:

- *Strengths and weaknesses of public and religious education*
- *Descriptions of students taught in public and religious education environments*
- *Socioeconomic backgrounds of students taught in public and religious education environments*
- *Educational backgrounds of parents of students taught in public and religious educational settings*
- *Home lives of students enrolled in public and religious education*
- *Student attitudes toward education*

Statistics – apply basic numerical and statistics concepts.



Alabama presenters led the southeast at the regional 2007 Mid-South Educational Research Association (MSERA) annual conference for the second consecutive year. Six southern states, including Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Kentucky, and Arkansas make up the regional organization.



The Mid-South Educational Research Association was formed in 1972 as a nonprofit incorporated educational organization to encourage and provide results of quality educational research in elementary and secondary schools and in institutions of higher learning.

The 2007 conference was held at the Austin Hotel in Hot Springs, Arkansas, on November 7-9. Eighteen professors from Jacksonville State University presented fourteen different concurrent sessions. JSU was second in the state for number of faculty presentations. The University of South Alabama ranked first in the state with seventeen presentations.



DR. HARPER PRESENTS TO THE JSU BOARD OF TRUST A PLAN TO RECOGNIZE CE&PS GRADUATES

Dr. Cynthia Harper, dean of the College of Education and Professional Studies, gave a presentation to the JSU Board of Trustees in July detailing how the College prepares its prospective teachers for teaching under the Alabama Reading Initiative.

“We are in line with what the state is promoting as effective teaching of reading standards,” said Dr. Harper, adding these standards came from the National Reading Panel. “Those are all scientific research-based techniques and strategies that will promote a significant increase in reading awareness and reading performance in children.

Candidates enrolled in the College of Education and Professional Studies at Jacksonville State University gain direct exposure and experience with the modules set forth in the Alabama Reading Initiative through enrollment in a focused literacy block. The four course literacy block enforces basic reading skills in the Teaching Reading course. The reading and writing connection, as well as oral language development are taught in the Children’s Literature course and in the Developing Language Skills course.

Professors responsible for teaching the literacy block received specialized training in the Alabama Reading Initiative. Dr. Slenda Haynes is the professor of record for Teaching Reading, and has an earned doctorate in reading education. She is an associate professor of elementary education at Jacksonville State University and is trained in all modules of the Alabama Reading Initiative. The primary instructional textbook used in Teaching Reading is *Put Reading First, The Research Building Blocks for Teaching Children to Read*, a publication produced by the National Institute for Literacy. The book’s focus is on scientifically research-based instructional practices for teaching reading.

The fourth course included in the literacy block is Integrated Theory and Practice. While enrolled in this practicum course, candidates are required to complete

one hundred and twenty contact hours in an assigned public school classroom. The practicum provides candidates with their initial teaching experience and includes assignments that reinforce the content of the Alabama Reading Initiative. Experiences in children’s literature and language arts are part of the practicum. Additionally, candidates observe and participate as the classroom teacher directs various teaching/learning experiences.

The following semester candidates complete the

Reading Diagnosis course. Reading Diagnosis is designed to teach candidates to assess reading skills and to develop intervention strategies that support reading instruction for students identified as struggling readers. A practicum is included among the various course requirements. Under the direct supervision of a JSU faculty member, candidates assess student needs, and develop appropriate intervention strategies that are designed to improve reading skills.

The internship is the richest experience. The interns observe, participate and teach under the direction of a cooperating teacher and university supervisor. This field experience is the richest experience of the entire teacher education program of study. Candidates have the opportunity each day to apply the knowledge, skills and abilities acquired while enrolled in teacher preparation. During the internship, candidates are responsible for twenty consecutive instructional days that include teaching reading. By the end of the internship candidates have completed three hundred and fifty hours in a P-12 school setting.

Dr. Harper’s presentation was given at the to the JSU Board of Trustees meeting in order to request the board’s approval to make the same presentation for Governor Bob Riley. Dr. Harper will request that the Governor allow the College to present a certificate of accomplishment to candidates upon their completion of the baccalaureate degree because of JSU’s reading courses focus.





PREPARING FOR THE FUTURE

The Alabama State Legislature's recent school construction bond issue will help Jacksonville State University's College of Education and Professional Studies prepare for the future. For years the College of Education and Professional Studies has produced more teacher educators than any other university in Alabama. As Jacksonville State University grows the College of Education and Professional Studies must be able to accommodate more students, faculty and staff.

Ramona Wood Hall houses the offices for the College of Education and Professional Studies faculty and staff as well as the Learning Resource Center and the Multimedia Instructional Laboratories.

The College of Education and Professional Studies students make up about one third of all the students at JSU. The University has increased the number of students enrolled and is dedicated to continued growth.

Ramona Wood Hall. The annex will be part of the University quadrangle by occupying the site where Abercrombie Hall once stood.

Plans for the annex include a large auditorium/lecture hall, conference room, classrooms, a computer lab equipped with 30 computers, small group-study rooms and a student lounge. All of the classrooms will be equipped with current technology.

Dr. Meehan estimates the project will cost between \$9 and \$10 million, so the bond will cover a significant amount of the cost, but will not cover the total amount. An additional \$500,000 has been donated by area businesses.

"I hoped it would be more," said Dr. Meehan of the monies the university will receive through the school construction bond issue. "There are more opportunities, another pool of \$55 million is available for education


This growth has forced many education classes to be held in other buildings on campus. The College has always had to depend on other buildings to accommodate meetings and classes of over fifty people. The Learning Resource Center, the College's library is strapped for space to accommodate its holdings. The Teaching/Learning Center, the College's in-house practicum frequently holds tutorials in the halls of Ramona Wood. While the College has computer laboratories the schedule is tight curtailing some classes from incorporating a group experience in the facility.

"Additional space is needed to support education programs offered in the College of Education and Professional Studies," said Dr. Cynthia Harper, Dean of the College of Education and Professional Studies. "While the current facility is in excellent condition and is equipped with state of the art technology to support teaching, additional classrooms and office space for faculty are needed to support additional students."

Jacksonville State University President William A. Meehan plans to ask the Board of Trustees to set aside most of the nearly \$4.6 million JSU will get from the school construction bond for a planned annex on

purposes, and Jacksonville State University is hoping to get more funding for the planned annex on Ramona Wood Hall."

"From a personal perspective, this is the most exciting news the college has received in my 32 years of service at Jacksonville State University. Jacksonville State University has a rich heritage in teacher education that dates back to Jacksonville State University's foundational beginnings in 1883. Teacher preparation continues to be one of the most important professional programs that Jacksonville State University offers at both the undergraduate and graduate levels," said Dr. Harper. "This new facility will demonstrate to our candidates and to the public that JSU believes in and recognizes the important role that teachers have in helping shape the lives and careers of tomorrow's leaders."
