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September is National Preparedness Month...

"National Preparedness Month (NPM) is an observance each September to raise awareness about the importance of preparing for disasters and emergencies that could happen at any time. The 2021 theme is **"Prepare to Protect. Preparing for disasters is protecting everyone you love."**

This year, Ready Campaign shifted its focus in support of President Biden's Executive Order on Racial Equity and FEMA's new strategy for cultural competence that includes empowering historically underserved communities to prepare for disaster.

For the first time ever, the agency will feature a series of Public Service Announcements designed to resonate with Latino communities and beyond that will launch during National Hispanic Heritage Month. In fact, the theme "Prepare to Protect" which carries universal meaning and significance, was established based on research and focus groups with Latino communities led by the Ad Council that highlighted the idea of protecting one's family as a prime motivator to prepare for a disaster.

The White House stated: "During the past year, natural disasters have sent our communities into turmoil, and we have seen the particularly devastating toll they take on disadvantaged, low-income communities and people of color. [...] Therefore, we must all prepare to better protect ourselves and our communities against both immediate crises and their residual effects."
