Graduate Faculty Spotlight MS. JODI POE Head of Technical Services at the Houston Cole Library

My academic background is an undergraduate degree in Accounting from JSU and a Master's of Library and Information Studies from the University of Alabama. Like most librarians, I never dreamed of being a librarian. My original goal was to be an attorney (I really like to argue). However, I grew to love libraries and what they do for students through my job as a student assistant while working on my undergraduate degree at both the University of Montevallo and Jacksonville State University. Most of my time as a student assistant was in the Acquisitions unit in the Technical Services Department, though I did work at the Circulation Desk and shelved materials as well. I found that I liked the structure and "rules" that we had to follow in the Technical Services Department. One of my supervisors at the Library reached out to me about a full-time staff position in the Acquisitions Department. I was lucky enough to be selected for that position in September 1991 and have been here ever since.

My professional journey at JSU started as a student assistant, then as a member of the staff, then to my first faculty position as the Distance Education/Electronic Resources Manager, and now I am a Distinguished Professor and Head of Technical Services. In my current role, I oversee the day-to-day operations of the Acquisitions, Cataloging, Digital Assets & Special Collections, Distance Education & Electronic Resources, and Serials Departments. I am responsible for the four librarians who are faculty, seven staff members, and one working retiree. Our department not only buys the materials, both print and electronic, that are available for our students, faculty, staff, and community to use, but we also process them to make sure they can be found. I live in Anniston with my daughter, our three dogs, and two cats. My daughter, Emily, will be pursuing her Bachelor's Degree in Elementary Education beginning in the summer term. My second family is the group at the JSU Library. The Library Faculty and staff are a great group of people who are intelligent, friendly, funny, and consumed with a desire to serve our students, faculty, staff, and the community.
