Dr. Ellen Peck earned her Ph.D in 2009 from University of Illinois, Urbana in Theatre. She has been teaching here at JSU since 2010 in lower and many upper level courses. Also, she is the Stage Management Advisor for JSU drama productions, and her book, *Sweet Mystery: The Musical Works of Rida Johnson Young*, was published in 2020 by New York: Oxford University Press.

In 2014, Dean Wade invited me to accompany a group of Honors students on a trip to Taizhou University in China. I said yes because I love to travel and had never been to China. But the trip turned out to be one of the best experiences in my time here at JSU, primarily because of those students.
