






Respondent Snapshot

Gender of Students Responding




Students admitted as a "First-time Student" (348/58.49%) were most represented in the New Student Survey






Distance from JSU to Home:



Anticipated Major:

Fourteen percent of respondents were unsure of their major at the time they completed the survey. Of those who did pick a major, Nursing (17.14%), Emergency Management (5.21%), Pre-Business Management (4.87%), Criminal Justice (4.54%), Elementary Education (4.03%), Psychology (3.53%), Biology (3.36%), Pre-Health Professional Biology (3.19%), Art (2.86%), and History (2.69%) were among the top picks.

Compared to other people of their age, most of the respondents rated themselves at the highest 10% or above average in cooperativeness, drive to achieve, cooperativeness, understanding of others, leadership ability, emotional health, intellectual self-confidence, social self-confidence, competitiveness, physical health and academic ability.



Expectations:

Respondents indicated that they expected to have a very good or good chance to find a good job, be satisfied with JSU, make at least a B average, earn a bachelor's degree, and graduate with honors during college. They expected to have almost no chance to drop out of JSU permanently, drop out temporarily, fail one or more courses or seek counseling for personal problems.
