The 2017-2018 New Student Survey Results

Of the 423 new undergraduate students responding to the 2017-2018 New Student Survey, 66% were female, and 34% were male. A majority of the respondents were between 17 and 19 years of age (87%). Almost all (94%) were not married. Six percent had dependent children living with them. Seventy-two percent of the respondents' homes were between 11 to 100 miles from JSU. A little over one-half resided in residence halls during their first semester (54%), 27% lived at the home of parents or relatives, and 12% lived in a room or apartment off-campus. A majority (84%) depended on their parents, relatives, or friends as the primary source of their first year educational expenses. Forty-seven percent relied on Pell Grants, 52% on Federal direct loans, 30% on Faculty Scholarships, 16% on Leadership Scholarships, 7% on Athletic Scholarships, and 49% on other scholarships. Over one-third of the respondents were either undecided or didn't respond about their majors (35%). Of those who had decided on a major, 23% were in Nursing, 12% in Pre-Business, 7% in Computer Science, 6% in Criminal Justice, 4% in Biology, 4% in Exercise Science & Wellness, 4% in Music Education, and 3% in Elementary Education.

Their college choice

Factors that impacted their decision to attend college the most were:

- To learn more about things that interest them (95%)
- To gain a general education and appreciation of ideas (95%)
- To be able to earn more money (92%)
- To prepare for graduate or professional school (88%)
- To improve their reading and study skills (85%)
- To be able to get a better job (83%)

To obtain a bachelor's degree from JSU was the goal of the majority (90%).

Respondents indicated the following were "very important" reasons for their decision to attend JSU:

- Availability of a particular program of study, or major (78%)
- The availability of financial aid or scholarship (72%)
- JSU's academic reputation (62%)
- Cost of tuition and fees (60%)
- The location of JSU (57%)
- The variety of courses offered (47%)

Over one-half of the respondents learned about JSU from a Preview Day or campus visit (66%), from friends at JSU (61%), from their parents or relatives (60%), and through the JSU Web site (56%).

Expectations

More respondents (74%) estimated that they would have a very good chance to earn a bachelor's degree at JSU. In addition, 65% expected to have very good chance to find a good job after graduation in the field in which they studied. Seventy-six percent expected to have a good chance or a very good chance to take part in volunteer or community service work while at JSU. Sixty percent thought they would have no chance of failing any courses.

Over one-half (58%) reported not working while attending JSU, 26% spent up to 20 hours a week working on a job, and 16% spent 30 hours or more a week working. A majority (82%) planned to spend 20-40 hours a week on school work, 3% planned to spend 50 hours a week and 15% planned to spend less than 20 hours a week on school work.

Self-rating

When compared to other people their age, one-half or more rated themselves above average or in the highest 10% in the following traits:

- Drive to achieve (77%)
- Cooperativeness (71%)
- Academic ability (63%)
- Understanding of others (56%)
- Leadership ability (54%)
- Competitiveness (51%)

Student Self-efficacy and Self-efficacy with Technology

Nearly all respondents had access to a laptop or notebook computer (95%). A majority had access to other portable devices, i.e., iPad or smart phone (93%), and Internet connectivity 24 hours/7 days a week (85%).
