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NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

On the Ides of March, 44 BC, Julius Caesar was assassinated, the catalyst that removed democracy from the face of the earth for 2,000 years until some folks off the east coast of North America threw tea in the harbor. The freedoms and institutions we have grown up with, that we have inherited from the struggle of many generations of ancestors, can be swept away in an instant. How fragile is democracy? Government? Freedom? Peace? Caesar reaches us in three ways: as an historical account, as Shakespeare's reaction to early 17th century British politics, and as a testament to the delicacy of our own political reality. Tonight, you will see a Julius Caesar unlike any other. Set in a postapocalyptic Rome, we hope that you will find tonight's characters not unlike many of our own modern political figures. These people are soldiers, spouses, parents and charismatic leaders all trying to recover a country from the latest governmental fall. In an effort to appeal to a younger crowd, and to bring our modern sensibilities to the piece, we have updated everything about the play to reflect our modern society and the equal footing that we have been striving for as a nation in recent years. This choice has allowed us to make casting and artistic choices that stray far from the norm while illuminating a deeper aspect of Shakespeare's text. Caesar resonates like no other in the age of 'fake news,' by forcing us all to look deeper and judge slower. It reminds us of the necessity to question our own truths and motives, and those of our governmental leaders. What side of history will we all stand on and who will be the one to tell that history? Is Caesar truly a tyrant ready to hatch, or does Brutus fall victim to the envious voice of power and persuasion. Is human history doomed to repeat itself? Are the fates against us or do we have the power to learn from the past and truly enact change for the future. Julius Caesar unearths the very soul of human society: pride and power blanketed under the disguise idealism.

On behalf of the entire production and artistic team, let me be the first to welcome you to the Anniston Performing Arts Center as we begin this new endeavor to bring the bard back to Anniston. I cannot express how much it means to us that you have chosen to be here tonight, and we hope you will make it a family tradition for years to come!

JULIUS CAESAR

<u>Act One:</u> The play opens in the streets of Rome, where the citizens are gathered and eager to see Julius Caesar, who has recently defeated his fellow Roman, Pompey the Great. It was practically taboo to celebrate the defeat of a Roman by another Roman, and Cassius takes this opportunity to begin persuading Brutus that Caesar, if he is crowned king, will be a tyrant who will strip the citizens of their freedoms.

<u>Act Two:</u> Now the play moves indoors, where Shakespeare takes us into the minds of his characters. We see Brutus, above all, struggling with the two great forces : his private friendship with Julius Caesar versus his total commitment to the protection and wellbeing of Rome. Meanwhile, the conspirators, led by Cassius, come together and, through a devious means—anonymous notes —they draw Brutus into their plan to assassinate Caesar. Early the next morning, and also indoors, Caesar is warned by his wife that she has had an ominous dream foretelling his assassination, but the conspirators pay him a visit and reinterpret the dream in such a way that Caesar decides to go to the Capitol, thinking that he will be crowned king.

<u>Act Three:</u> At the Capitol, the conspirators make a show of being submissive to Caesar, which only encourages him to become imperious, at which point they kill him as if he is a sacrifice to the gods. The gruesome murder, which must be explained to the citizens, is then followed by two funeral orations, one by Brutus and one by Mark Antony. Brutus manages, in an utterly honest speech in prose, to explain and persuade the masses that the assassination was necessary. Antony, however, responds with an oration in stirring verse, throwing the crowd into a frenzied, murderous rage against all the conspirators.

<u>Act Four:</u> Brutus and Cassius, who have arrogated power to themselves, are now tortured by conscience and at odds with each other, their friendship strained almost to the breaking point. They are at war, with Antony and Octavius, who was the adopted son of Julius Caesar (together with Lepidus, they will eventually form a new triumvirate). The play moves indoors again, and the night before battle, Brutus is visited by the ghost of Caesar, which is Shakespeare's way of giving conscience a shape. Caesar, in this way, remains a presence in this play, even after his assassination.

<u>Act Five:</u> Cassius, his mind weakened perhaps by his own troubled conscience, makes a grievous error. Believing that his forces have been trounced by the enemy, he runs on his own sword, committing a ritual Roman suicide. This weakens the conspirators' effort and leads ultimately to the actual defeat of Brutus's forces. Brutus then, for good reason, commits suicide as well. To the Roman mind, it was better to die by one's own sword than to allow oneself to be killed by the enemy. The play ends with Octavius declaring Brutus "the noblest Roman of them all" and keeping the corpse in his tent to protect it until it may be buried with dignity.

ANNISTON & THE BARD

In 1972, Martin L. Platt brought William Shakespeare to Anniston, filling the void of Shakespeare and classical repertory in the Southeast. Their creative team sought to serve the state and region by producing theatre of the highest quality to educate and entertain audiences.



We seek the same today, and with Julius Caesar as required reading for 10th graders in Alabama, students are our target audience. The greatness of Shakespeare's work, his use of language and his ability to create a world of timeless characters make us imagine, relate and realize humans then are not that different to humans now. This project also strives to remove all barriers of comprehension and making arts accessible to all.

Back in the day, the Shakespeare Festival caught the attention of visitors from across the U.S. and brought them to Anniston, summer after summer. In 1985, the Alabama Shakespeare Festival moved to its current home in Montgomery's Blount Cultural Park. Now, 33 years later, the Bard is back in Anniston, and we hope you enjoy our professional production!
